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JANUARY MEETING

The January meeting of the AAAP will be held on Tuesday evening, January 8, 1980 at 8 p.m. in Peyton Hall of Princeton University on Washington Road in Princeton. A film from the Kitt Peak National Observatory entitled, "Journey into Light," will be shown.

The pre-meeting dinner will be held at the Rusty Scupper Restaurant on Alexander Road in Princeton beginning at 6:00 p.m. Members generally meet upstairs in the bar for drinks at 5:45 p.m. before dinner.

FEBRUARY MEETING

Dr. Gareth Williams of the Geophysical Fluid Dynamics Laboratory of NOAA in Princeton, will speak on the weather on Jupiter and Saturn at the February 12th AAAP meeting.

DECEMBER MEETING

Mr. Jeremy Goodman, a Princeton graduate Student, spoke on cosmology at the December AAAP meeting. Of man's scientific disciplines cosmology ranks as having the greatest space and time scales, contrasted with the study of subatomic particles dealing with the smallest space and time scales. The greatest complication lies in the middle range of scales of time and space where most scientific investigations operate. The fundamental measure of the expansion of the Universe is Hubble's constant which for many years has been taken to be 50.3 km/sec/megaparsec although a recent study suggests that it may be closer to 100 in these units. Its reciprocal (20 billion years) is the age of the Universe under the questionable assumption that this constant does not vary with time.

Regular Friday members observing sessions will be discontinued on a formal basis this month although every Friday night which is clear will probably bring a member or two out to the Observatory. Weather and road conditions in the Park may make access to the Observatory difficult at times this month. Since the Park management has put a second gate on the Phillips Farm Road, it is now necessary to reach the Observatory via Brick Yard Road from Church Road on the north. Our padlock has been moved to the Brick Yard Road gate near the Nature Center.
