SEPTEMBER MEETING

Dr. Mitch Struble from the University of Pennsylvania talked about the work he has done with computer simulations in comparison to galaxy clusters. He also discussed what is known about the three different types of clusters, ranging from those with a lot of spirals to clusters with very few or no spirals.
